Introduction/Four Unfulfilled Needs	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	11:10	Students are disruptive because they have unmet needs. Once you figure out the need of the child, that need can be met. Our behavior is our best attempt to meet our needs at that time.
Classic: Role Involvement	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	6:14	Children thrive in the classroom when their needs are met. The student needs to know what his/her role is and is not. A need fulfilling space invites learning. The most effective rules are ones that are made with the students.
Introduction/Reality Therapy	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	5:43	Help students see how to get what they want and see if their actions are helping them get what they want
Tones and Gestures	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	2:44	Tones and Gestures are most important when trying to communicate a message. Body structure can sometimes cause a power struggle. Only a tenth of the message is in the words.
Rules and Procedures	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	5:26	Asking students questions such as: What do you want? What are you doing? Is it working? Do you want to make a plan?
Learn Reality Therapy Questions	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	8:40	Teachers should give students power when they are disruptive. Students should be given the power to change their own behavior. It should not be teacher controlling. We need to ask students, "Is what you're doing working for you? Is it helping you get what you want?"
Parents and Reality Therapy	Helping Disruptive Students	Educators	4:19	Showing parents that all student behavior is purposeful. Reality training helps students to make better choices at school and at home. Reality therapy shows how to make students feel more empowered.
