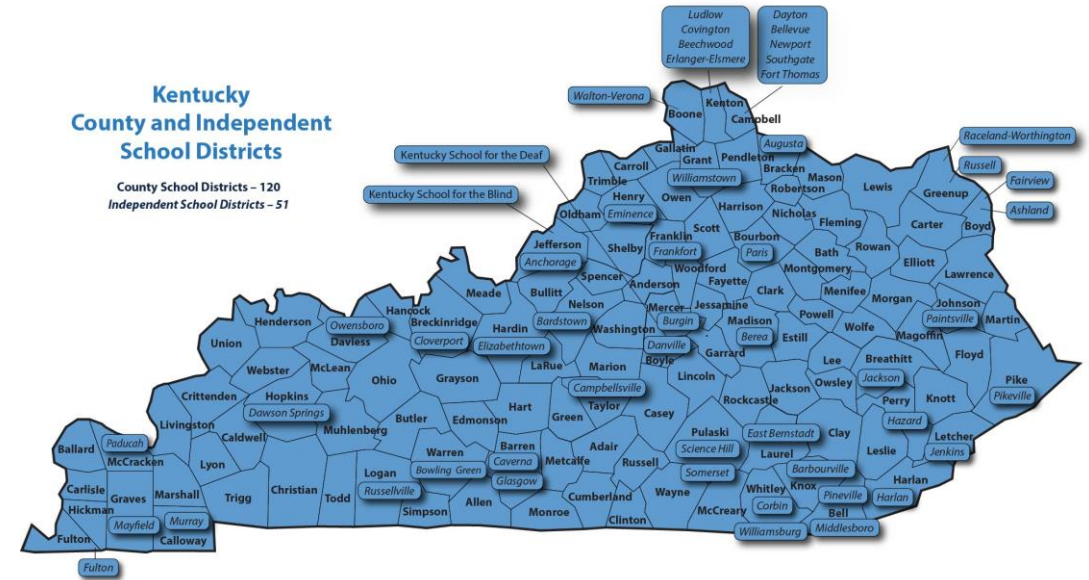

- KDE received a total of 1,367 nominations, including at least one from every school district in Kentucky.
- Teachers who have been nominated will start to receive their application packets this week. Applications are due by Feb. 21.
- Kentucky Teacher Achievement Award winners and finalists for the Kentucky Teacher of the Year will be honored at a special ceremony in Frankfort in the fall of 2023.
- The 2024 Kentucky Teacher of the Year will serve Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 2024.

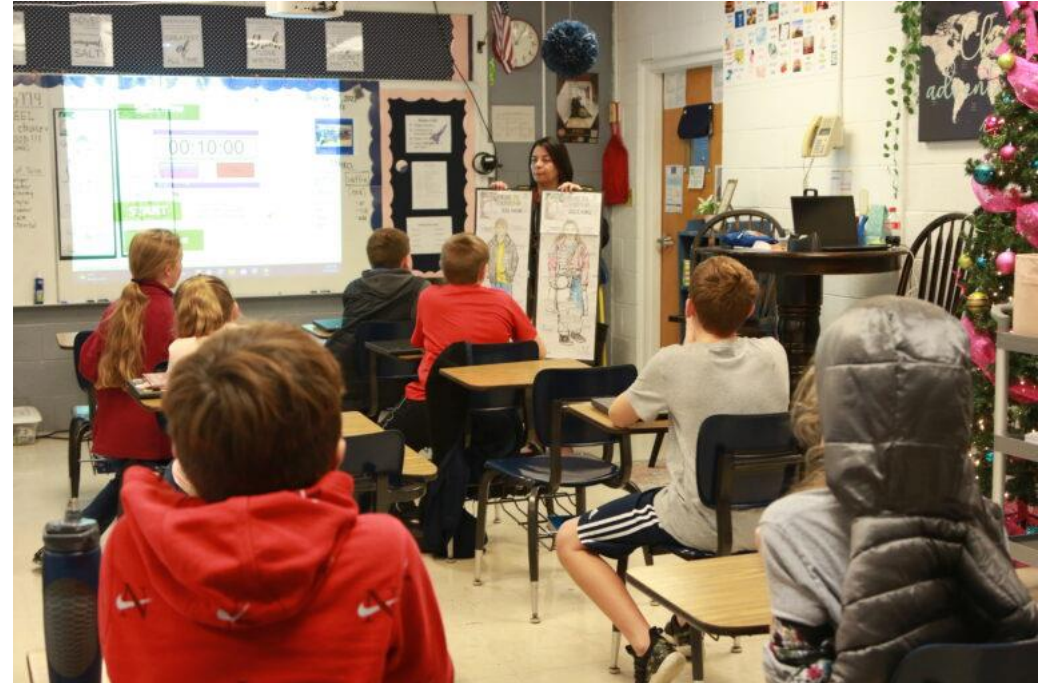
KDE's Summer Food Service Program to Provide Training for Sponsors

Kentucky Students Chosen for 2023 U.S. Senate Youth Program

- David Daniel, a junior at Owensboro High School (Owensboro Independent), and Heng Yang, a senior at Conner High School (Boone County), were selected from among the state's top student leaders to be part of the national 104-student delegation of the [United States Senate Youth Program \(USSYP\)](#).
- Daniel and Yang will also each receive a \$10,000 college scholarship for undergraduate study from The Hearst Foundations.
- They will represent Kentucky during the 61st annual USSYP Washington Week, to be held March 4-11.
- Zachary Clifton, a junior at Corbin High School (Corbin Independent), and Audrey Gilbert, a senior at Frankfort High School (Frankfort Independent), were chosen as alternates.

Vibrant Learning Experience - Dec. 19

- The Kentucky United We Learn **Vibrant Learning Standing Committee** met on Monday, Dec. 19, to continue the work that began on Nov. 30.

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)

- The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is a federal law that makes available a free appropriate public education to eligible children with disabilities throughout the nation and ensures special education and related services to those children.
- The IDEA governs how states and local school districts nationwide provide early intervention, special education and related services to more than 7.5 million (as of school year 2020-2021) eligible infants, toddlers, children and youth with disabilities.

Kentucky's Obligation to Monitor Special Education Programs

- Each state must have a General Supervision System to monitor the implementation of IDEA within its public agencies (local school districts).
- The General Supervision System documents the state's accountability for enforcing the implementation of IDEA and ensuring continuous improvement with a particular emphasis on those requirements most related to improving educational results for children with disabilities (34 CFR § 300.600).

Kentucky's Obligation to Monitor Special Education Programs (Cont.)

- IDEA monitoring has a long history in Kentucky. In 2008, the Kentucky Board of Education promulgated 707 KAR 1:380 to ensure implementation of the IDEA.

Types of Programmatic Special Education Monitoring in Kentucky School Districts

- [Local Education Agency \(LEA\) Annual Determinations](#)
- Risk Focused Monitoring
- Alternate Assessment Participation
- A review of district-submitted data that populate Kentucky's IDEA State Performance Plan/Annual Performance Report.

LEA Annual Determinations

- The IDEA requires states to make determinations annually on the special education performance of local school districts within the state.
- Every local school district in Kentucky receives an Annual Determination on its special education performance.

Risk Focused Monitoring

- ***Risk Focused Monitoring*** is a differentiated monitoring process. It is risk-based and individualized.
- ***Risk Focused Monitoring*** includes desk reviews and on-site monitoring to provide technical assistance and support to the most at-risk local school districts in the state.
- ***Data Sources:*** [LEA Annual Determinations](#) and the [Risk Assessment Rubric](#)
- ***Results from Risk Focused Monitoring*** are used as data to inform the guidance and support developed by the Division of IDEA Implementation and Preschool.

Identification for Risk Focused Monitoring

Option	District Annual Determination	Risk Assessment Rubric Score	Number of Years Since Last On-site Monitoring Visit
1.	Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention or Needs Substantial Intervention	N/A	Two or more
2.	Meets Requirements	5% of districts with greatest risk	Five or more

Alternate Assessment Participation

- Focuses on the decisions for students to participate in the alternate assessment
- KDE conducts off-site desk reviews:
 - *If participation data reveals disproportionality in the percentage of students participating in the alternate assessment; or*
 - *Randomly by selecting 10% of all other districts using an online randomizer (www.random.org).*

Kentucky's IDEA SPP/APR Compliance Indicators

- The IDEA requires each state to develop a State Performance Plan. This is a six-year plan describing Kentucky's efforts to implement the IDEA and how Kentucky will improve its implementation.
- Each year, Kentucky reports progress toward annual targets in an Annual Performance Report.
- The State Performance Plan/Annual Performance Report includes annual targets for 17 indicators that measure a mix of student outcomes and compliance with the requirements of the IDEA.

SPP/APR Compliance Indicators

Targets for compliance indicators are set by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Special Education Programs. Kentucky cannot adjust those targets. Compliance indicator targets are set at either 0% or 100%.

Significant Discrepancy: Indicator 4B

- **Indicator 4B:**

Measures the percent of districts with significant discrepancy by race/ethnicity in suspensions/expulsions of greater than 10 days for students with IEPs due to failure to adhere to policies, procedures or practices aligned with the IDEA.

- **Data sources used:**

- *Dec. 1 Child Count Under the IDEA* and
- *Safe Schools Report*

Indicator 4B

- KDE monitors through a two-step process which includes:
 - Step 1:** A review of district-reported data from Infinite Campus (IC) to identify if discrepancies by race exists in out-of-school removals.
 - Step 2:** If a discrepancy 3 times greater than the state target exists: KDE conducts off-site desk reviews of student special education records to determine the cause of the significant discrepancy.
If a discrepancy greater than 3 times the state target **does not** exist: KDE takes no further action on this issue.

Disproportionate Representation: Indicator 9

- **Indicator 9:**

Measures the percent of districts with disproportionate representation of racial/ethnic groups due to inappropriate identification for special education.

- **Data sources used:**

- *Dec. 1 Child Count Under the IDEA and*
- Enrollment data for all students as reported on the same year's membership data as of Dec. 1

Indicator 9

- KDE monitors through a two-step process, which includes:
 - Step 1:** A review of district-reported data from Infinite Campus to determine if disproportionate representation exists.
 - Step 2:** If disproportionate representation exists:
KDE conducts off-site desk reviews of student special education records to determine the cause of inappropriate identification.
If disproportionate representation **does not** exist:
KDE takes no further action on this issue.

Disproportionate Representation in Specific Disability Categories: Indicator 10

- **Indicator 10:**

Measures the percent of districts with disproportionate representation of racial/ethnic groups in specific disability categories due to inappropriate identification for special education.

- **Data sources used:**

- *Dec. 1 Child Count Under the IDEA* and
- Enrollment data for all students as reported on the same year's membership data as of Dec. 1

Indicator 10 (Cont.)

- KDE monitors through a two-step process which includes:

Step 1: A review of district-reported data from Infinite Campus to determine if disproportionate representation exists.

Step 2: *If disproportionate representation exists:*

KDE conducts off-site desk reviews of student special education records to determine if disproportionate representation is a result of inappropriate identification for special education.

If disproportionate representation does not exist:

KDE takes no further action on this issue.

Child Find: Indicator 11

- **Indicator 11:**

Measures the percent of children evaluated within 60 school days of receiving parental consent for an initial evaluation for special education.

- **Data source used:**

- Self-reported data from districts

Indicator 11 (Cont.)

- KDE accepts 90% of the self-reported data without additional verification:
 - *KDE randomly identifies 10% of all districts that report 100% compliance; and*
 - *Conducts off-site desk reviews for those districts. An off-site desk review does not include staff interviews or a visit to the district.*

Early Childhood Transition: Indicator 12

- **Indicator 12:**

Measures the percent of children found IDEA Part B eligible with an Individual Education Program (IEP) implemented by the child's 3rd birthday.

- **Data source used:**

- Self-reported data from districts

Indicator 12 (Cont.)

- KDE accepts 90% of the self-reported data without additional verification:
 - *KDE randomly identifies 10% of all districts that report 100% compliance; and*
 - *Conducts off-site desk reviews for those districts. An off-site desk review does not include staff interviews or a visit to the district.*

Secondary Transition: Indicator 13

- **Indicator 13:**

Measures the percent of youth ages 16 and older with measurable, annually updated IEP goals and appropriate transition assessment, services and courses.

- **Data source used:**

- Self-reported data from districts

Secondary Transition: Indicator 13 (Cont.)

- KDE accepts 90% of the self-reported data without additional verification:
 - *KDE randomly identifies 10% of all districts who report 100% compliance; and*
 - *Conducts off-site desk reviews for those districts. An off-site desk review does not include staff interviews or a visit to the district.*

Legislative Process

- 2023 General Assembly adjourned Friday until Tuesday, Feb. 7
- Last day for bill filings
 - Senate: Tuesday, Feb. 21
 - House: Wednesday, Feb. 22
- Veto period: March 17-28
- GA reconvenes March 29
- Sine die March 30

Bills of Interest

- **HB 1** - Income tax
- **HB 18** - Dual credit scholarships
- **HB 20** - Increase the minimum amount for advertising and bidding school building projects from \$7,500 to \$30,000
- **HB 30** - Ensure that student privacy exists in school restrooms, locker rooms and shower rooms
- **HB 32** - Allow for the hiring of classified personnel without a high school diploma or equivalent
- **HB 33** - Innovative Teacher Education Grant Program

Bills of Interest (2)

- **HB 50/SB 50** - Make school board elections partisan
- **HB 88** - Funding for education initiatives (Governor's proposal)
- **HB 99** - Require the Kentucky Department of Education to create a professional development training schedule for certified personnel; require each local district to implement the schedule
- **HB 119** - Authorize participation in a public school interscholastic extracurricular activity by an at-home private school student
- **HB 31, HB 92, HB 101 and HB 110** – Vaccine requirements/immunization exceptions/health mandates

Bills of Interest (3)

- **SB 9** - Remove eligibility for a KEES scholarship if convicted of hazing
