FY24 Math Achievement Fund (MAF) Mini Grant

Grant Applications Due: Wednesday, Nov. 8, at 4 p.m. ET

Award Amount: \$40,000

Matching Funds Requirement: No

Funding for implementation of high-quality instructional resources for Tiers 1, 2 and/or 3, for grades K-12. Seventy-five awards will be made.

FY24 Early Learning Bus Grant

Grant Applications Due: Wednesday, Nov. 15, at 4 p.m. ET

Award Amount: \$100,000

Matching Funds Requirement: No

Funding to support 34 school districts across the state in converting a school bus into a mobile classroom to offer learning opportunities after school and during the summer for preschool students. There will be seven awardees per RTC region (6 in the Ashland RTC region, as Martin County has already received funds).

FY24 Kentucky Innovative Learning Network Travel Grant

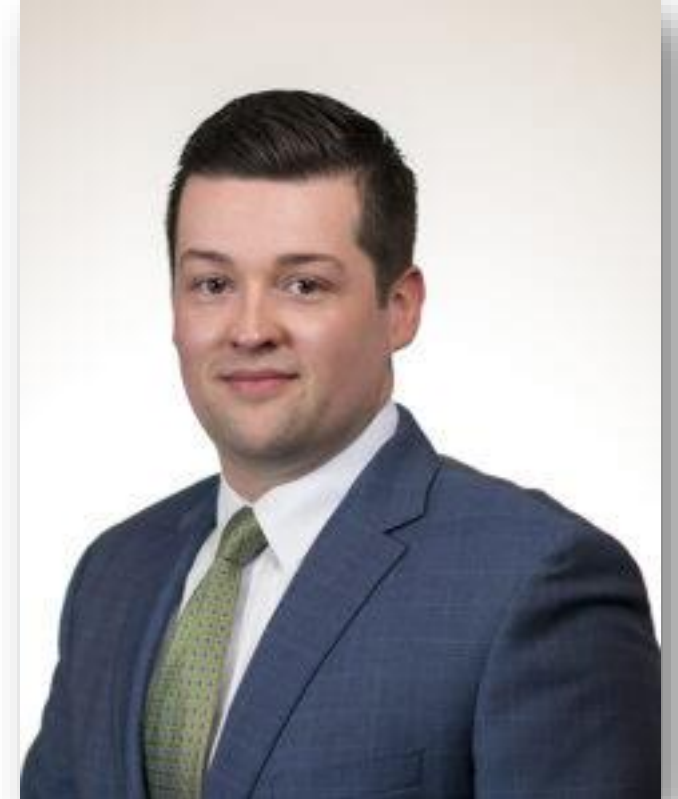

KRS 158.305 HQIR Adoption Update

Adoption of High-Quality K-3 Comprehensive Reading Program

- Senate Bill 156 (2023) amended KRS 158.305, which is part of the Read to Succeed Act, related to the adoption and implementation of high-quality instructional resources (HQIRs) for K-3 reading.
- The law establishes that by **July 1, 2024**, “each superintendent **shall adopt a common comprehensive reading program** that is **determined by the department to be reliable, valid, and aligned to reading and writing standards** required by KRS 158.6453 and outlined in administrative regulation promulgated by the Kentucky Board of Education **for kindergarten through grade three (3) for all schools or a subset of schools**, with consultation of all affected elementary school councils” (emphasis added).
- “Common” means the adopted HQIR is utilized for K-3 by all elementary schools or a subset of schools within a district.
- KRS 158.792 defines “comprehensive reading program” as “any print, nonprint or electronic medium of reading instruction designed to assist students. For students in kindergarten through grade three (3), program instructional resources shall include instruction in five (5) key areas: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.”

Key Resource to Assist Districts

- The [Reading and Writing Instructional Resources Consumer Guide](#) defines high-quality instructional resources (HQIRs) and assists districts in the evaluation and selection of a primary Tier 1 comprehensive reading program.
 - Intended to help decision-makers in Kentucky districts select HQIRs aligned to the *Kentucky Academic Standards for Reading and Writing* that meet the unique needs of students, educators and local communities.
- KDE further recommends districts consider both an explicit, systematic, cumulative, multisensory reading foundational skills supplemental resource, as well as a rich, knowledge-building curriculum for Tier 1 universal instruction.

Implementation of KRS 158.6455

- Kentucky's Accountability System, [KRS 158.6455](#)
- Exclusive list of accountability indicators are based on Status (current year performance) and Change Score (difference between prior year and current year Status Score).
 - State Assessment Results in Reading and Mathematics;
 - State Assessment Results in Science, Social Studies and Writing (on-demand and editing/mechanics);
 - Progress on English Language Proficiency;
 - Quality of School Climate and Safety Survey;
 - Postsecondary Readiness (high school only); and
 - Graduation Rate (high school only).
- An Overall Performance Rating combines all available indicators.

Status Scores

The Status Score represents the current year outcome for a given indicator.

Change Scores

- Change Scores are a simple subtraction of Prior Year Status Scores from Current Year Status Scores.
- They are calculated the same way for every Indicator.

$$\text{Current Year Status Score} - \text{Prior Year Status Score} = \text{Change Score}$$

- Prior Year Status Scores are used to calculate Change Scores. They are not used to influence Indicator Performance Ratings.

Indicator Scores

- Indicator Scores are a simple combination of Status Scores and Change Scores.
- They are calculated the same way for every Indicator.

Current Year Status Score + Change Score = Indicator Score

- Indicator Scores are used to produce Overall Scores. Each Indicator Score is weighted, and the weighted Indicator Scores are added together to produce an Overall Score.

Adding Change Score to Status Score

- Simple and easy to communicate
- Minimizes the impact of no change
- Standard-setting panelists had an opportunity to recommend cut scores that reflect the 5x5 Indicator Rating table
- Allows reasonable weighting of Status and Change to produce each Indicator Score and thereby Overall Scores
- Within the minimum and maximum range of the indicator scale (e.g., 0-125, 0-140)

Elementary School Report Card Example

Overall Score = Combination of Weighted Indicator Scores

Overall Performance Rating (color)

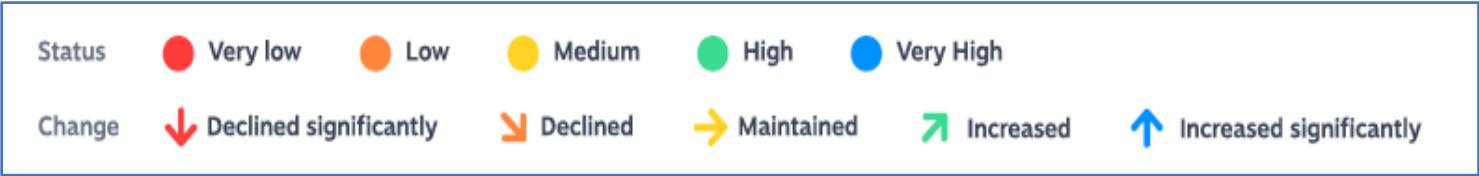
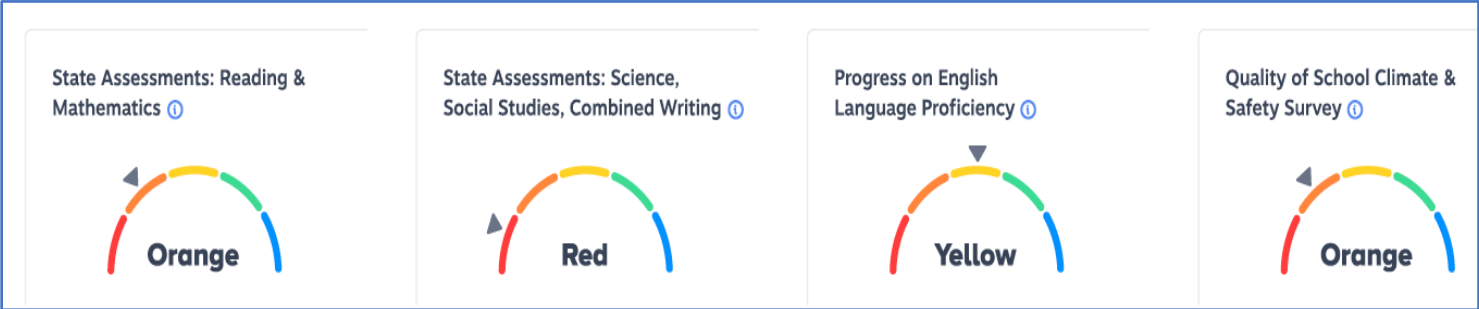
Weighted Indicator Score = Indicator Score multiplied by the weight

KDE and LSAC Approval

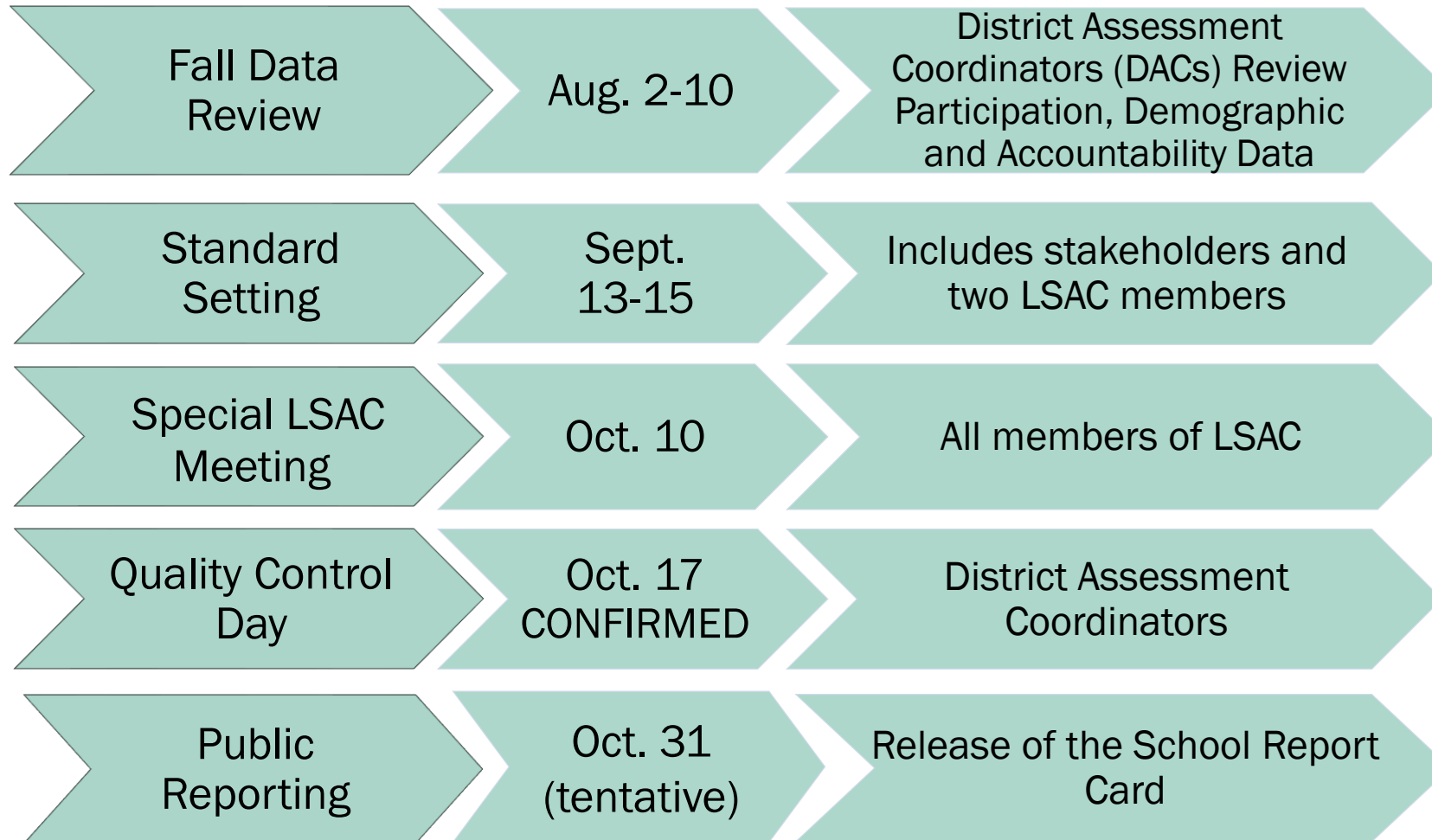
- The Accountability Standard Setting Committee unanimously recommended cut scores to the Kentucky Department of Education and the Local Superintendents Advisory Council (LSAC).
- LSAC and Interim Commissioner Kinney approved the cut scores based on the recommendations from the Accountability Standard Setting Committee on Oct. 10.

Federal Classification in 2023

- Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) identification is required annually. Fall 2023 identification is based on two consecutive years of data (2021-2022 and 2022-2023).
- The next identification of Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI I and CSI II) will be in the fall of 2025.
- Schools that no longer meet identification criteria and have demonstrated progress will exit federal classification status in 2023.
