c. Hyphen	The student selects but incorrectly chooses punctuation that is used most often in compound words.


¹Teenagers need 8 to 10 hours of sleep every night. Most teens get less than 7 hours of sleep every night. ²Most schools start before 8:30 a.m. Teen hormones usually make teens sleepy from about an hour before midnight until 8 a.m.

³Some high schools are starting school later so the students get more sleep. Teens still go to sleep at the same time they always did, but they are sleeping longer every night. ⁴The teens have better behavior and better grades when they get more sleep. However, when a school starts later it will also end later.

⁵Many high schools do not have a later start time because of student participation in after school sports, clubs, and jobs. A later start time creates transportation issues for school districts, making it difficult for students to participate in after school activities. ⁶School districts with later start times have used creative solutions like public transportation and mixed-age bussing to ease these concerns.
