### **ENTRY OF ACT TEST SCORES IN INFINITE CAMPUS**

There are now ACT tests that are being paid for by districts and administered in the district. It is possible that a student can take a national test (at a national test site) and a district test (at a district site) in the same month. KDE currently enters all National ACT tests with the default date of the 1st. Going forward, we will enter the District test in the National templates and give them a default date of the 2nd of the month. So, the February National test will be entered with a February 1, 2019 date and the February District test will be entered with a February 2, 2019 date. This way if a student takes both the National and District tests in the same month, we can distinguish one from the other. If you have any questions, please contact [Raymond Carter](#).

### **KDE LAUNCHES SCHOOL REPORT CARD WEBSITE, FRIDAY, JANUARY 18**

(FRANKFORT, KY) – The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), in partnership with BrightBytes, today launched the Kentucky School Report Card, the fourth component in its School Report Card Suite. The online tool includes data metrics and visualizations to highlight key information about schools and districts. This includes school demographics, test performance, teacher qualifications, student safety, parental involvement and more. All components of the School Report Card Suite are now live at [raisethebar.education.ky.gov](https://raisethebar.education.ky.gov).

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The suite also includes the previously released Kentucky School Proficiency Dashboard, a web-based tool that compares proficiency levels of Kentucky schools and districts; KDE's Open House website, which provides access to supplemental school and district data; and the Infinite Campus portal, a parent-friendly portal where parents can find information on their children via a smartphone mobile app. Under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), each state in the U.S. was required to create an online school report card as part of its statewide accountability system.

No new assessment data is part of the release. The data is the same 2017-2018 school year data released in the fall of 2018, however the School Report Card provides interactive illustrations, charts and graphs, to help parents better be able to visualize the data and what it means for their child's school.

“We are working hard to ensure that Kentucky parents and educators have great tools available to see and understand the performance of our schools,” said Kentucky Education Commissioner Wayne Lewis.

“We are excited to offer this suite that will help everyone from parents to policy makers determine their school and district’s strengths, weaknesses and needs.”

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## **ACT STUDENT DATA UPLOAD (SDU) AVAILABLE IN PEARSONACCESSNEXT**

The Student Data Upload (SDU) has been entered into [PearsonAccess<sup>next</sup> for ACT](#) and is ready for use by schools. Based on the information in this file, schools will receive pre-printed barcode labels. The enrollment counts for your initial order will also be based on the counts in the SDU.

Test Coordinators must verify student counts (from SDU) and make any updates, including adding new students, **now through January 25**. If a student is enrolling in or un-enrolling from your school before the test administration, you must submit a request for ACT staff to complete enrolling or un-enrolling for your school. (Students entered in the system after January 25 will not receive pre-printed bar code labels.)

## **ACT ACCOMMODATION AND ENGLISH LEARNER (EL) SUPPORTS REQUEST DEADLINE**

The [Test Accessibility and Accommodations \(TAA\) system](#) will **remain open through January 25** for requesting ACT-approved accommodations and supports for English Learners on the spring ACT exam. Test Coordinators or Test Accommodation Coordinators must request specific accommodations and/or EL supports prior to this deadline. If the deadline is missed, students must take the ACT with standard time (no accommodations) or with non-college reportable accommodations. **(Late consideration cannot be requested due to missed deadlines.)**

The process can take a few days. In order to meet the deadline, it should be started well ahead of January 25. [The TAA User Guide](#) includes directions for completing tasks in TAA.

There is no request in TAA for non-college reportable accommodations. Simply order appropriate materials through [PearsonAccess<sup>next</sup> for ACT](#) per the ordering window listed in the [Schedule of Events](#).

## **ACT ONLINE TESTING SITE READINESS**

Schools planning to administer The ACT online must complete site readiness process. During this setup, schools will need to configure computers to ensure that successful testing can be completed online. Completing the check list may take an extended period of timing

depending on the specific needs of the school. The process includes installing the Proctor Cache software. E-mails containing resources for the site readiness have been sent from ACT State Testing to Test Coordinators and copied to DACs. **The deadline for completing is January 25.** If the school cannot meet the criteria for successful online testing, the school will automatically be issued paper materials.

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### **FINAL REVIEW OF 2017-2018 DROPOUT DATA EXTENDED**

The final review period for the 2017-2018 dropout data extracted in November has been extended to allow schools and districts additional time to review and make changes to the data. This data review period will end at **3 p.m. ET on Friday, January 18.** The Dropout data is available for your review in the [Student Data Review and Rosters](#) (SDRR) application. If you do not have access to SDRR in Web Applications, please contact your Web Apps Admin Point of Contact (WAAPOC). You can find the name of your WAAPOC in the [Open House directory](#).

This will be the final review period and no changes will be accepted after this review period ends.

### **SCORES IN INFINITE CAMPUS (IC)**

The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) strives to publish student results data in IC as it becomes available. In this spirit, ACT National scores for the 2018-2019 school year have been imported into the State Edition of IC. The scores are from the September and October administration of the National ACT exam. KDE will publish these scores to all districts beginning on Tuesday, January 15.
