KBE Accepting Nominations for 2023 Grissom Award for Innovation in Special Education

- The Kentucky Board of Education is accepting nominations for the 2023 Grissom Award for Innovation in Special Education.
- The award is given each year to a Kentuckian or a Kentucky organization to honor outstanding dedication to improving achievement for students with disabilities.
- The award is named in honor of the late Johnnie Grissom, a longtime Kentucky Department of Education employee who provided steadfast commitment, service and leadership as she strived to help all students with disabilities achieve at high levels.
- The nomination deadline is May 19. Anyone interested in submitting a nomination should use the 2023 Grissom Award for Innovation in Special Education nomination form. The winner will be announced in August.



Kentucky School for the Deaf Brings in Alumni, Special Guests for Bicentennial Celebration

- Founded on April 10, 1823, the Kentucky School for the Deaf (KSD) was the first state-supported school of its kind in the U.S. It also is only the fourth school specifically for Deaf children in the country's history.
- On April 14, the school hosted alumni and current students for a series of events to mark the bicentennial. The morning started with a special guest panel of KSD alumni, including an Olympian, a former CIA agent and the oldest surviving alum who went to KSD in the 1940s.
- The group also opened a time capsule that was buried by students by a tree in front of Kerr Hall in 1998.



KY Tuition Waiver

- State benefit
- www.veterans.ky.gov
- May be used in conjunction with Chapter 35 (federal benefit)
- For <u>dependents</u> of eligible veterans
- 45 months of tuition waived at Kentucky state-funded college or university
 - Does not include books, fees, room/board
 - Expires upon receipt of degree or certificate
 - Expires when child turns 26 (active duty exception possible)



Waiver Eligibility



- Veteran must be Kentucky resident or died in Kentucky
 - KRS 164.505 Unlimited tuition waiver
 - KRS 164.507 45 months/Age limited
 - KRS 164.512 Unlimited waiver for disabled child
 - KRS 164.515 Veteran disabled not 100% S/C but receiving NSCP
- Deceased veteran
 - Active duty death
 - Service-connected death
 - Deceased wartime veteran
 - 100% at time of death
- Living veteran
 - 100% service connected or IU (P & T not required)
 - Receiving non- service-connected pension





KRS 164.505

- Unlimited waiver
 - No degree limit
 - No age limit
 - Still restricted to Kentucky-funded schools
- Eligibility
 - Veteran joined military from Kentucky
 - Veteran died in Kentucky or on active duty
 - Veteran's death was service-connected







- 45 months of training
- Upon completion of 1 degree
- 26 years old age limit
- No age limited for un-remarried widow/widower
- Still restricted to Kentucky-funded schools
- Eligibility
 - Veteran joined military from Kentucky
 - Veteran died in Kentucky or on active duty
 - Veteran's death was service-connected







- Unlimited waiver for disabled child of veteran
 - No degree limit
 - No age limit
 - Still restricted to Kentucky funded schools
- Eligibility
 - Veteran is a Kentucky resident
 - Child's disability directly related to veteran's service





KRS 164.515

- 45 months of training
- Upon completion of 1 degree
- 26 years old age limit
- No age limited for spouse
- Still restricted to Kentucky funded schools
- Eligibility
 - Veteran is P/T disabled for pension purposes
 - Veteran joined military from Kentucky
 - Veteran died in Kentucky or on active duty
 - Veteran's death was service-connected





Required Documentation

- **DD214** Character of discharge, point of entry into service, wartime service
- **DD1300** Verification of death on active duty, point of entry into service
- Marriage license Dependency, residency
- **Birth certificate** Dependency, residency
- Adoption papers Dependency, residency
- **Death certificate** Date and cause of death, residency at time of death
- **DIC award letter** Service connection of death
- VA rating decision Service-connected disabilities, pension eligibility
- VA award letter Service-connected disabilities, pension eligibility
- Tax documents, driver's license, utility bill Residency



Area Technology Center (ATC) Salaries

• KRS 156:808 (6) (e): Supplementary information for the salary schedule for certified and equivalent staff including teachers, counselors, administrators, managers and educational consultants in state-operated vocational technical facilities, field offices and central office in the Office of Career and Technical Education that shall provide uniformity, recognition of education, teaching, and supervisory experience and use as a base the average salary paid to beginning classroom teachers by all public schools in the state for personnel with comparable qualifications and experience. Indexes may be incorporated in the compensation plan for administrative responsibilities. The salary schedule shall be computed annually, and shall be submitted to and approved by the governor.



ATC Programming Structure

• KRS 157.069 (1) (a): "Secondary area technology center" or "secondary area center" means a school facility dedicated to the primary purpose of offering five (5) or more technical preparation programs that lead to skill development focused on specific occupational areas.




ATC Program Closures


- KY Tech Policy 8.1 "A program with a STR of 12.5 or less will be flagged for closure" with the program notified via letter by Dec. 30.
 - Establish Program Improvement Committee
 - The flag period will remain in place through May 1 of the next school year.
 - If the program obtains a 12.5 STR following the flagging period, the program must sustain 12.5 STR for five (5) consecutive years.
 - If the program does not sustain above a 12.5 STR, the Associate Commissioner will, upon consultation with the Program Improvement Committee, make the determination for closure.

Work-Based Learning for Postsecondary Readiness

- In May, a data collection system will be available for hours of onthe-job work experience associated with cooperative and internship courses within Infinite Campus. Results will be used by the Office of Assessment and Accountability (OAA) to indicate students' career readiness and will be reported in the next state public release of accountability data.
- KBE and KDE are working to establish minimum criteria for approval of a cooperative or internship that is not offered as a high school course. Further guidance will be provided to districts once the Local Superintendents Advisory Council has provided input and an approval process has been established.

Purpose of the Kentucky United We Learn Council

The council was created to give a broad stakeholder voice to the process of learning in Kentucky. This will go along with the Kentucky United We Learn work already underway in the field. The council will evaluate and recommend strategic practice, policy and investment ideas to state policymakers and the citizens of Kentucky. The state commissioner of education and the council's chair will work with KDE staff, the KBE and, if necessary, the Kentucky General Assembly to respond to the United We Learn Council's recommendations.

Vibrant Learning Experiences (VLE) - Mar. 6

- VLE Chair Justin Dunning presented the committee with nomination and voting information regarding the election of a new Kentucky United We Learn Council chair and vice chair.
- The committee also discussed site visits, which was the group's most requested method of learning about vibrant student experiences. Members of the committee will have the opportunity to participate in site visits to Marshall County and Eminence Independent.
- In response to committee members' request to also learn from national organizations,
 Sarah McCann, project manager for The Canopy Project, joined the meeting to introduce
 members to The Canopy Project database as a resource for exploring innovative schools
 and practices across the U.S.

- Chair Caleb Bates led the meeting, which focused on a general overview of the work required under various grants, specifically the Competitive Grants for State Assessments, and the role that partners such as KnowledgeWorks and statewide Kentucky partners have played and will play in this work.
- The meeting then transitioned to a discussion of the United We Learn report's
 themes and recommendations. Committee members discussed the importance of
 honoring the work that went into developing the report and ensuring the
 committee's work aligns to the spirit of its vision.



Accelerating Innovation – Mar. 8

- Chair Kathy Stovall led the meeting and discussed the committee charter, which was finalized and adopted in a unanimous vote prior to the meeting.
- Committee members presented information they collected on assessment and accountability systems from inside and outside Kentucky.
- Following presentations, committee members considered design principles
 that originated from the research and discussed non-negotiables to be
 reflected in any future recommendations from the committee.
- Members discussed the habits of the Kentucky United We Learn Council, reciprocity, inclusion, empathy and co-creation.



Legislative Process

- Barring the governor calling lawmakers in for a special session, they won't be back in session again until January 2024.
- Any bill, or any section of a bill, with an emergency clause becomes effective immediately upon enrollment.
- Bills without an emergency clause become effective 90 days after sine die (March 30).
 - AG opinion 23-03: The effective date of legislation, other than general appropriation bills and acts containing emergency or delayed effective date provisions, passed during this session is Thursday, June 29, 2023.

Senate Bills

- Senate Bill (SB 3) provide educators' liability insurance for certified employees of public schools
- SB 5* allow parental challenges to materials, programs and events that may be harmful to minors
- SB 7* wage deduction of dues, fees or charges associated with a labor organization or for political activities
- SB 9 anti-hazing bill
- SB 25* postsecondary readiness indicators
- SB 49* changes to alternative teacher certification
- SB 70 implements the performance-based professional development pilot project from the 2023-2024 school year through the 2025-2026 school year



Senate Bills (Continued)

- SB 93 relating to school property in Lewis County
- SB 156 creates a statewide reading research center
- SB 169 grants a local board of education the authority to enter into public-private partnerships on behalf
 of a local school district
- SB 107* requires Senate confirmation of the commissioner and limit contracts to four years at a time
- SB 150* parental rights, transgender prohibitions related to children under 18, requires school boards to adopt policies related to the use of restrooms, locker rooms or shower rooms
- SB 247 allows transient public-school students to remain in their school if they move in-district
- SJR 98 directs the Council on Postsecondary Education to study placing a new regional, residential, fouryear university in southeastern Kentucky and the allocation of responsibility between the Kentucky Community and Technical College System and regional universities



House Bills

- House Bill (HB) 3 juvenile justice bill
- HB 5* bourbon barrel tax
- HB 13 increases the time period allowed for the required physical examination from 12 to 24 months for school bus drivers
- HB 32* allows for the hiring of classified personnel without a high school diploma or equivalent if the district provides the employee the opportunity to obtain a high school equivalency diploma at no cost to the employee
- HB 244 Kentucky Guard Youth Challenge Program
- HB 241 to clarify the evidence requirements for exemption from compulsory attendance due to physical or mental conditions
- HB 319 teacher recruitment and retention



House Bills (Continued)

- HB 331 emergency medical preparedness of schools
- HB 393 surplus property
- HBs 444* and 448* appropriations bill
- HB 538 student discipline bill
- HB 506 classified retirees can return after one month.
- HB 540 school safety bill related to private and parochial schools
- HB 547 prohibits a school district from punishing an employee for engaging in private religious expression otherwise protected by the First Amendment absent a showing of engaging in actual coercion
- HB 553* additional SEEK funding for growth districts this fiscal year



HB 319

- Section 1 adopts the Interstate Teacher Mobility Compact.
- Section 2 mandates that KDE develop a system for school districts to report exit survey information without providing personally identifiable information for use in evaluating factors impacting teacher retainment.
- Section 3 relates to the KEPS system and directs the department to operate and maintain the system to ensure that job postings are current, including tracking each unique position posted, monitoring for repeated position postings, and removing outdated postings, and to collect accurate data about employment in public schools. Also requires the department to report annually to the IJC on Education regarding job postings.
- Section 4 makes changes to the existing teacher scholarship program but does not appropriate additional funding.
- Section 5 amends KRS 161.048 to require the EPSB to establish procedures to issue alternative route candidates an eligible-for-hire letter.
- Section 6 directs districts to post vacancies in the Kentucky Educator Placement Service System at least 15 days before being filled.
- Section 7 directs OELE to undertake a review of the alternative pathway teacher certification options and processes and the level of participation in each to identify areas for improvement, including but not limited to duplication, inefficiencies and unnecessary or outdated requirements that cause barriers to candidates and option providers seeking to use alternative teacher pathways to fill needed teacher shortages. A report is due to the IJC on Education by Oct 1.
- Section 8 creates a new one-year interim certificate, renewable for up to two years, for those with a bachelor's degree and at least four years of work experience in the area in which certification is being sought (along with other requirements).
- Section 9 will allow teachers to submit a statement instead of a notarized affidavit for sick leave.
- Section 10 does the same things for other school employees and their personal leave.
