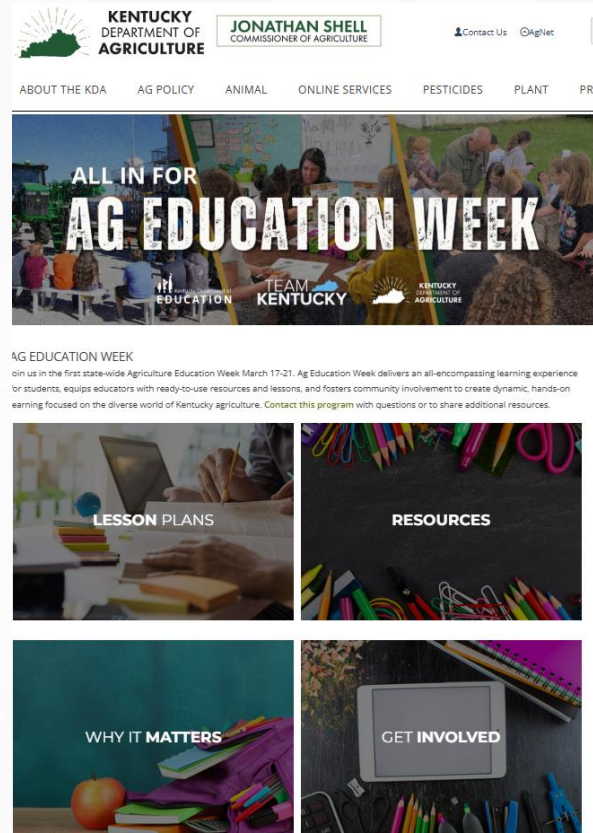

ALL IN FOR AG EDUCATION WEEK: DESCRIPTIONS		
Activities	Level	Descriptions
Literacy Lesson	K-5	Using the Ag Book of Kentucky's Ag Education Week, students build skills in literacy through stations and activities. The Ag Book of Kentucky's Ag Education Week is provided by Kentucky Pork Producers and Farm Credit Mid-America.
Mystery Farm Mascots	K-5	Each grade is given daily hints about who their farm mascot is with reveal on Friday. In Flat Stanley spirit, students take their mascot on their Friday ag education journey and share using the QR code on the mascot.
Clue In on Ag Careers	K-5	Students are given 4 clues about an unexpected career in agriculture, emphasis on technology and up and coming. Reveal at the end of the day with a short video or activity about the career. Each grade level has 5 different ag careers.
The Real Ag Experience	K-5	A hands-on ag experience. This can be a field trip to tour a farm or agribusiness or with a volunteer speaker/teacher who will Bring Ag to the Classroom. Utilize KDA Real Ag Experience Map to contact local ag tour or guest speaker/teacher.
Stories About Ag	K-5	Through partnership with Kentucky Farm Bureau, volunteers read agriculture books to students in grades K-5. Virtual Read Aloud Library available for as well.
Science Lesson	K-5	Developed by KDE, students in grades Kindergarten through 2nd will learn more about pollination and its impact on agriculture. Students in grades 3rd through 5th will learn about erosion. Both use inquiry-based learning to help agriculturalists.
Ask an Aggie	K-12	Live panel of agriculturalists answer questions from students across the state. Teachers submit questions on behalf of their classroom by March 1, 2025. Panel to showcase diversity in agriculture and chaired by Miss Kentucky.
Harvest for Home	K-12	A student-led community service event with a focus on harvesting skills, resources, or time for the community. This could be a canned food drive for a food pantry, building little food pantry or libraries, starting a recycling program or a school garden, etc.
Letters for Farmers	K-12	Students write cards or letters of appreciation for farmers to be delivered to farmers during The Real Ag Experience or dropped off at UK/KSU Extension and/or Farm Bureau offices and distributed to farmers in their community.

Kentucky Sees Gain in 4th-Grade Math Scores on 2024 NAEP, Holds Steady on Other Scores

- Kentucky's 4th-grade math students saw an increase in their scores on the 2024 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). Only 14 other states made statistically significant gains in 4th-grade math during this testing cycle.
- The rest of Kentucky's scores in 4th-grade reading and 8th-grade math and reading held steady.
- This was the first time Kentucky students have progressed or held steady on NAEP since the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The Commonwealth's students also were above the national average in both 4th- and 8th-grade reading, as well as 4th-grade math.

Agriculture Education Week Announcement

- Lt. Gov. Jacqueline Coleman, Commissioner of Agriculture Jonathan Shell and Commissioner of Education Robbie Fletcher announced that March 17-21, 2025, will be the first statewide Agriculture Education Week in Kentucky.
- Gov. Andy Beshear will sign a proclamation that week to officially mark this historic event.
- During Ag Education Week, every elementary student throughout Kentucky will be engaged in learning more about agriculture.
- K-2 students will be learning about pollination through an agricultural lens and students in grades 3-5 will be learning about erosion.

New Futuriti Website Aims to Help Kentuckians Explore Education and Career Options



- During a “virtual ribbon-cutting” ceremony at the Capitol Rotunda on Feb. 4, leaders from the Commonwealth Education Continuum launched the website, [Futuriti.org](https://www.futuriti.org).
- This new platform aims to help Kentuckians “find their future” by providing state-specific data about the numerous career paths and education options available to them.
- The Council on Postsecondary Education has led this work, with assistance from the Kentucky Center for Statistics and KDE.
- The website is organized into three main sections that are designed to lead Kentuckians through the process of choosing a career path, continuing their education and starting their career.

FY25 Kentucky AED Grant

- Grant applications due: Feb. 28, 4 p.m. ET
- Award Amount: \$2,000 per AED award.
- Matching Funds Requirement: No

The Kentucky Automated External Defibrillators (AED) Grant will assist districts with the purchase of new devices when none are presently available; replace AEDs that are more than 8 years old; and increase the inventory of such devices all to improve survival rates in the event of a cardiac event.

FY25 Kentucky Numeracy Counts Grant

- Grant applications due: March 6, 4 p.m. ET
- Award Amount: \$70,000 per awarded district
- Matching Funds Requirement: No

The Kentucky Numeracy Counts Fund grant shall only be used to purchase approved high-quality research and evidence-based curriculum aligned to kindergarten through grade 3 academic standards in mathematics and expenditures for curriculum-based professional learning to implement a new curriculum.

FY25 Equipment Assistance Grant

- Grant applications due: Feb. 14 at 4 p.m. ET
- Award Amount: Up to \$25,000
- Matching Funds Requirement: No

The KDE Division of School and Community Nutrition is making available the FY24 Equipment Assistance grant. The competition is open to School Food Authorities (public schools/districts, private schools, residential childcare institutions) that participate in the National School Lunch Program that are at least 50% or above free and reduced-price meals. Funds may be used to purchase new equipment, renovation of equipment or replacement of equipment.

Increase protective factors to help prevent substance use and behavioral health challenges among military-connected youth in Kentucky.

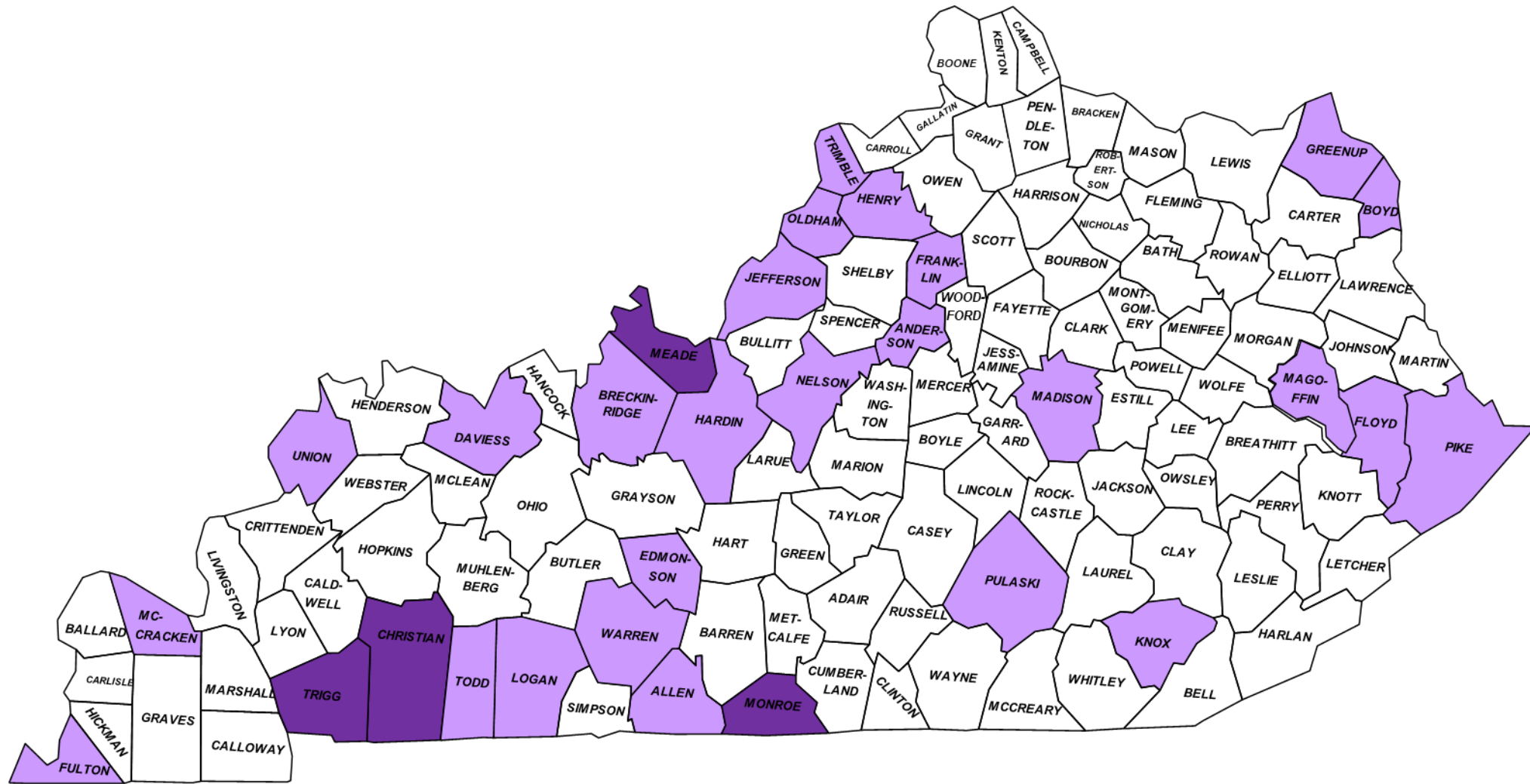
3.

Purple Star Schools in Kentucky

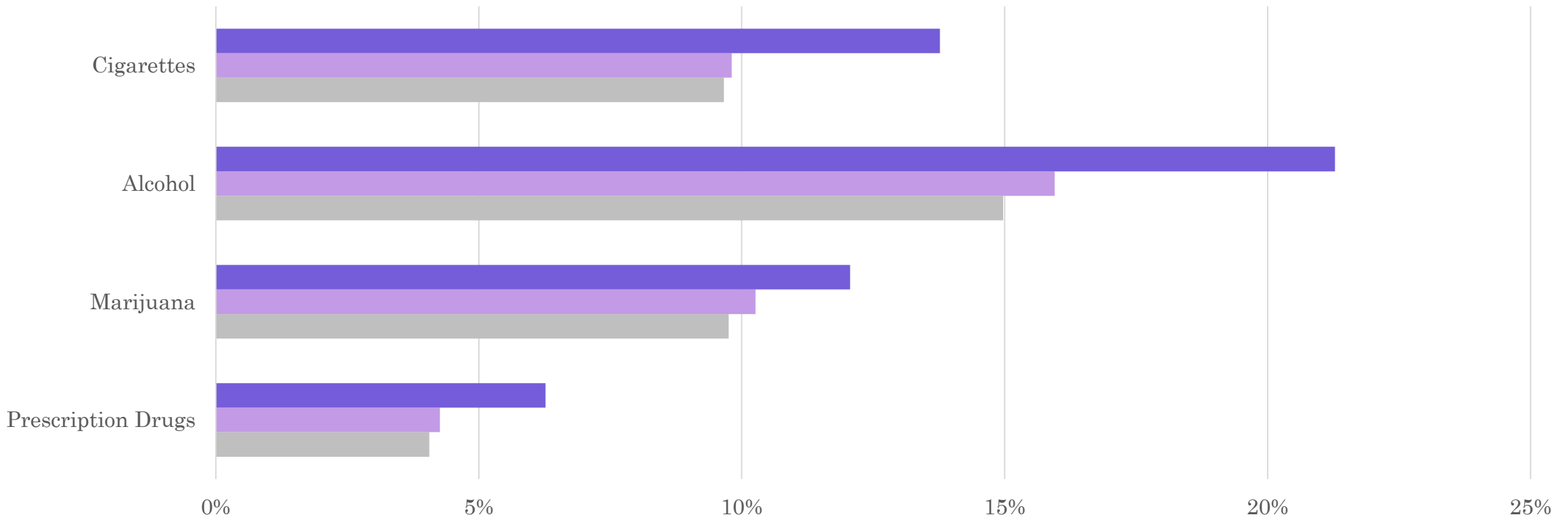

What Does the Purple Star Program Do?

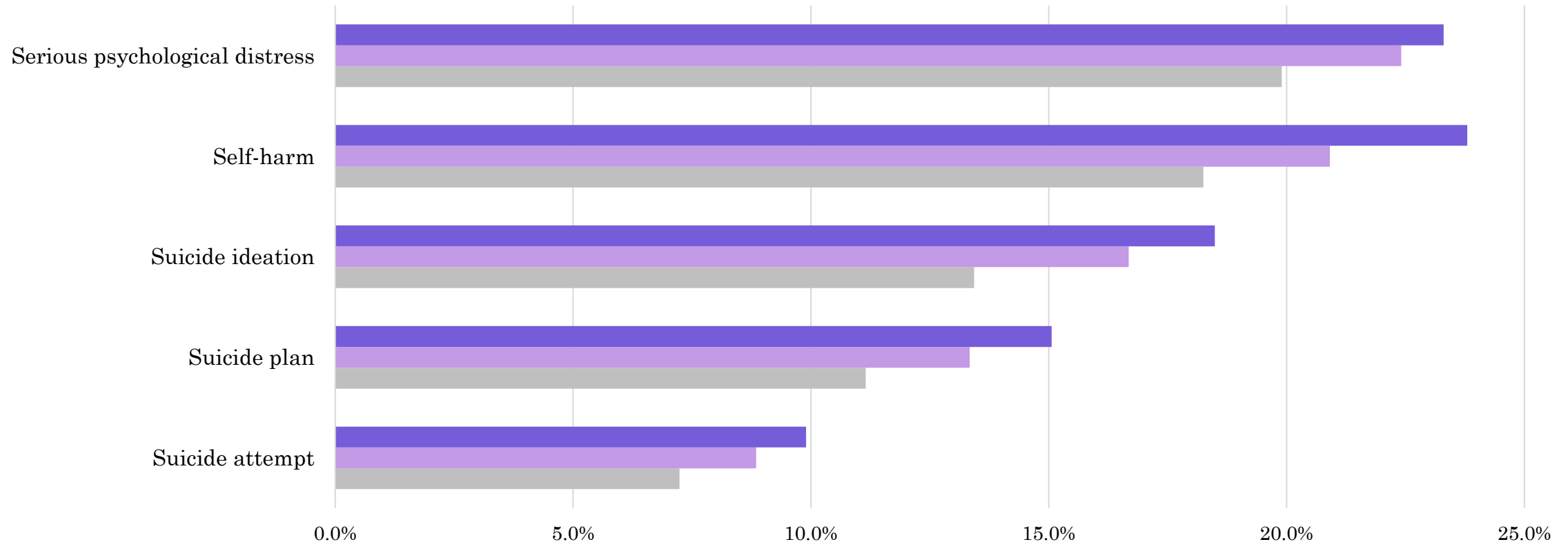
- Helps military-connected youth overcome academic and socio-emotional challenges of military life (frequent moves parental, deployments).

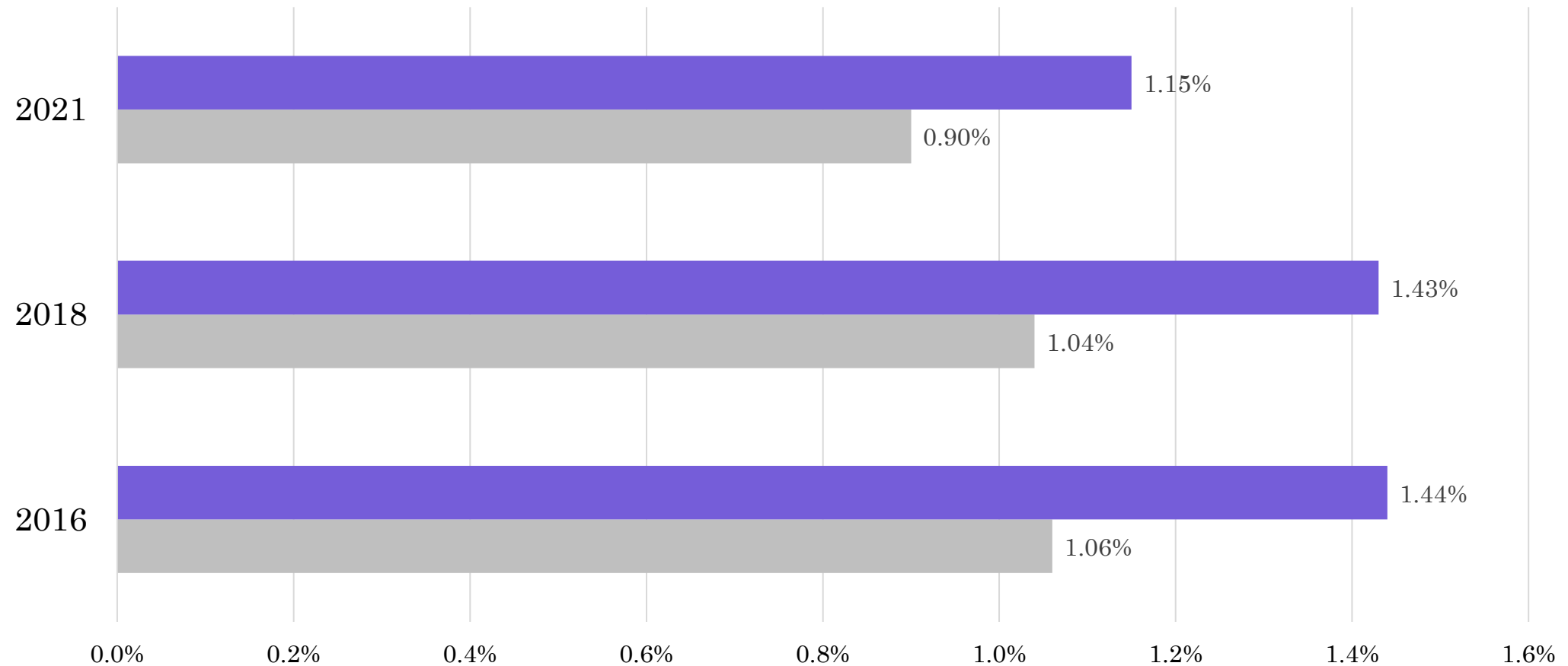

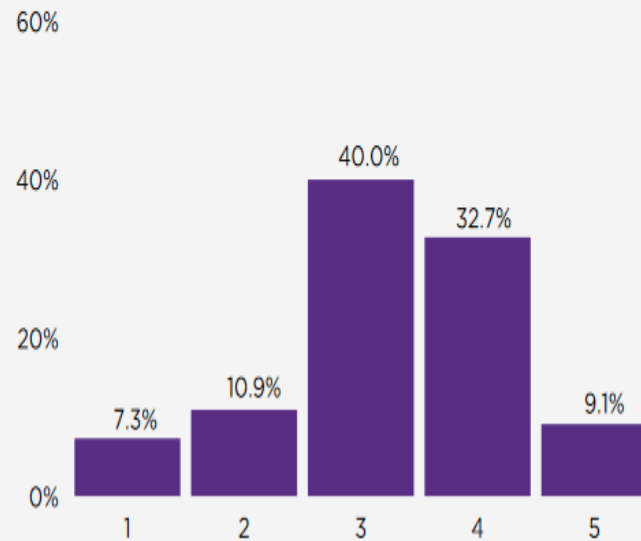
- Met with the Statewide Kentucky National Guard Teen Council during their annual training Day

“How would you rate the impact of the Purple Star program on the academic progress of military-connected children at your school?”

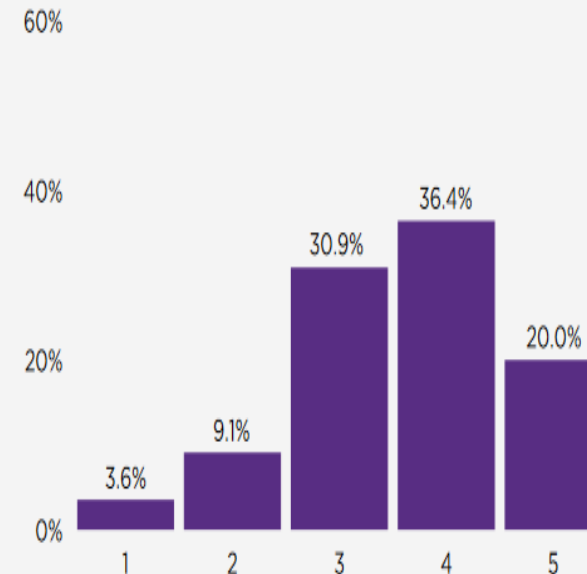
(1 = No Impact, 3 = Some Impact, 5 = Significant Impact)



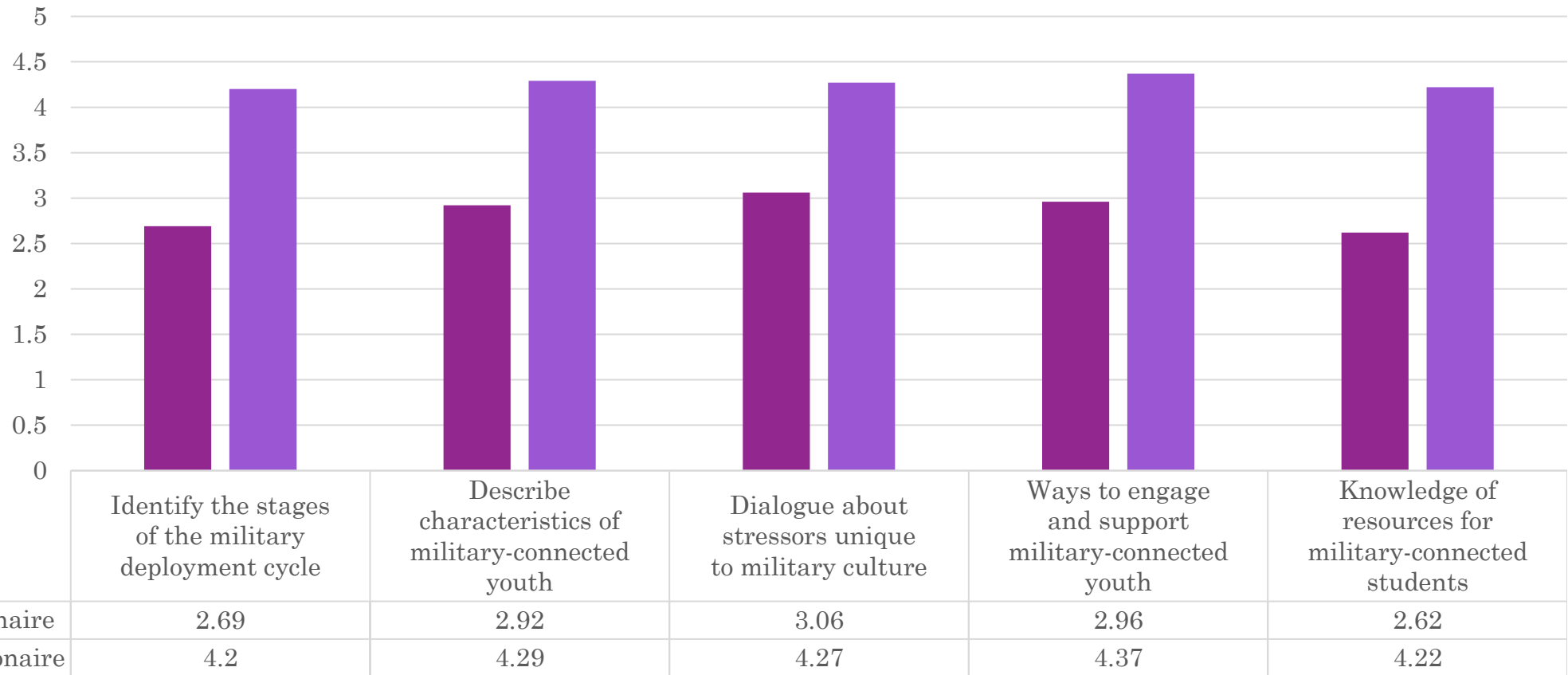

Purple Star Liaisons Report Increased Knowledge

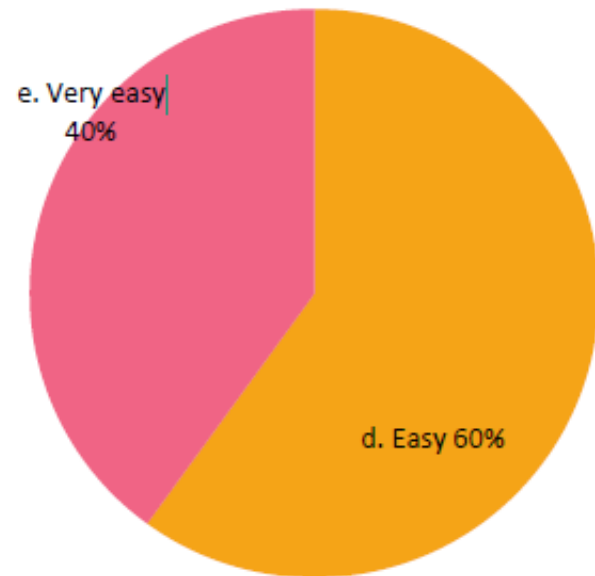

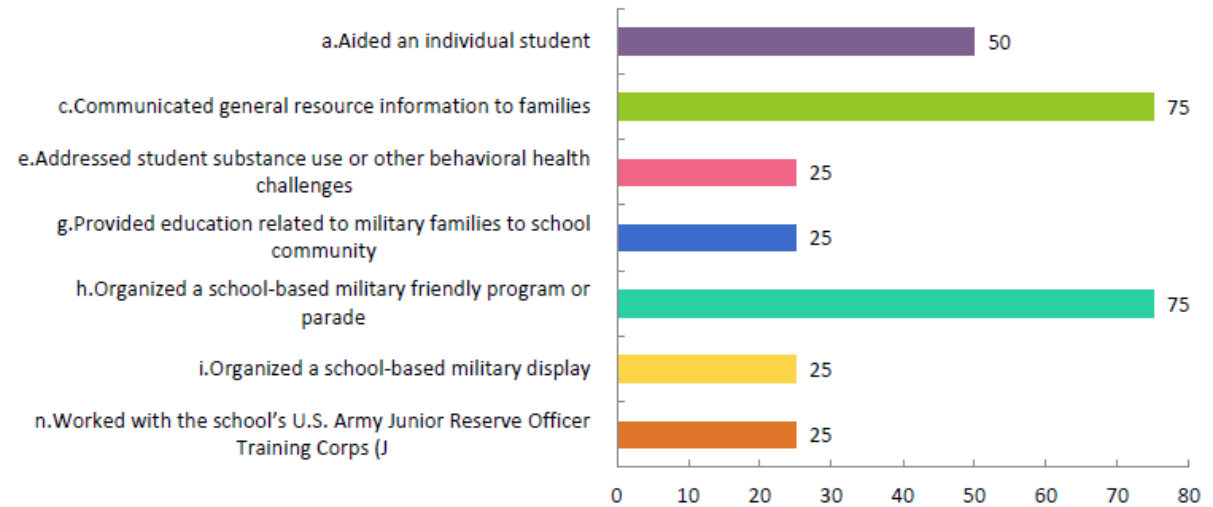

ONE-ON-ONE EDUCATOR/MILITARY CHILD DISCUSSION RESOURCES

In addition to the full-class resources included here, Global Game Changers has other resources available on our Educator Portal which, although not specifically geared toward military-connected children, may help you handle some of the emotions that these children experience. These students may act out an emotion for reasons you can identify (e.g., they miss a parent who is serving away from home, they're unsettled by a move to a new school or home, or they worry about a parent who is experiencing the aftereffects of a tour of duty), or they may act out for reasons neither they nor you can initially identify (e.g., fear triggered by a news story).

In these cases, we recommend that you support these students by engaging in a safe conversation about what and how they are feeling and by providing them with coping mechanisms.
