New Legislation

HB1 – Budget Bill (SEEK)

- Per pupil \$4100 FY23, \$4200 FY24
- SEEK lapse to General Fund in both fiscal years
- Includes funding for full-day kindergarten (approximately \$125.9M)
- Includes additional funding for pupil and vocational education transportation

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 Includes additional funding for NBCT and speech language pathologist salary supplement

HB9 - Charter Schools

- Provides a funding mechanism for charter schools <u>https://apps.legislature.ky.gov/recorddocuments/bill/22RS/hb9/bill.pdf</u>
- Pilot project Jefferson County and Northern Kentucky
- Charter application shall include a MOU with district of location endorsing the application in districts with student enrollment of 7,500 or less



HB 44 – Mental Health Days

- Mental health days: <u>https://apps.legislature.ky.gov/record/22rs/hb44.html</u>
- Permits but does not require a district to include provisions in its attendance policy for excused absences due to a student's mental or behavioral health status
- KDE will create and push down an Excused absence code to be used by districts who choose to grant mental health absences

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- Allows KDE to pull data on this code if it is uniform
- Announcement of code/guidance forthcoming this summer

HB 63 – School Resource Officer

• Each campus in a district must have a certified School Resource Officer by August 1, 2022

- SRO should be assigned to and working on-site full-time in the school building or buildings on the campus
- If sufficient funds and qualified personnel are not available for this purpose for every campus, the local board of education shall fulfill the requirements of this subsection on a per campus basis, as approved in writing by the state school security marshal, until a certified school resource officer is assigned to and working on-site full-time on each campus in the district

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• There is no additional funding provided

HB 194 – High School Equivalency Program

 Amends KRS 158.143 to provide that a student enrolled in a district-operated alternative education program shall be eligible to seek attainment of a High School Equivalency Diploma under certain conditions

- It provides: A local board of education shall adopt a policy to define when a student enrolled in a district-operated alternative education program is not on track to graduate
- The Kentucky Board of Education may publish a recommended model policy for local boards of education but shall not impose any restrictions or requirements upon the content of the local board policy
- HB 194 does not define "on track to graduate"
- Guidance will be included in existing Alternative Education guidance from OCIS
- Also contains the following provision:
 - (3) Notwithstanding KRS 159.010 or any school district policy adopted pursuant to KRS 159.010, a student who has attained a High School Equivalency Diploma in accordance with subsection (1) or (2) of this section shall be exempt from compulsory attendance

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HB 397 – Western KY Tornado Disaster Relief

 Waives up to 15 student attendance days for school districts were closed due to tornado disaster.

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SB 151 – Federal School Breakfast

- <u>Senate Bill 151</u> authorizes schools that participate in the Federal School Breakfast Program to provide up to 15 minutes of the students' attendance day for children to eat breakfast during instructional time.
- KDE will not release specific guidance on SB 151.
- The bill allows students to eat and learn, whether that is grab and go or eat wherever while attendance, announcements and learning begins.
- Under the existing law, districts are to arrange bus schedules so that all buses arrive in sufficient time to provide breakfast prior to the beginning of the student attendance day.
 - Under the new provisions, a superintendent may also authorize up to 15 minutes to eat during instructional time.
 - The previous version of the statute limited the ability to provide 15 minutes for breakfast to 8 times per school year.

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• Districts will keep doing what they have been doing but allow some option of breakfast while in the classroom.

HB 563: Nonresident Student Policies



KRS 157.350 - Nonresident Policy

For SEEK eligibility purposes:

- <u>Until July 1, 2022</u>, KRS 157.350 permits districts to include nonresident students in Average Daily Attendance (ADA) when listed under a written agreement between a nonresident district and the resident district.
- <u>By July 1, 2022</u>, districts must adopt a nonresident pupil policy to govern the terms under which the district shall allow nonresident student enrollment. Students admitted under the policy may be included in ADA.

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KRS 158.120 – Nonresident Policy

- By July 1, 2022, districts shall adopt a nonresident policy that governs the terms under which the district shall allow enrollment.
- Upon allowing nonresident pupils to enroll, the policy shall allow enrollment in any public school located in the district.
- Policy shall not discriminate between nonresident pupils
 - May recognize capacity, as determined by district
- Policy and any subsequent changes shall be filed with KDE no later than 30 days after adoption.

Nonresident Policy Considerations

- Method to annually determine capacity for enrollment of nonresident pupils at each district school;
- Method for accepting nonresident pupil applications for enrollment;
- Criteria for enrolling and assigning nonresident pupils to schools within the district;
- Method of determining enrollment when capacity is insufficient to enroll all students who apply;

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Nonresident Policy Considerations (cont.)

- Term of enrollment for nonresident students (at least one full school year);
- Whether transportation will be provided to nonresident students;

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- Notification of the resident district; and
- How will information be made public.



KRS 156.070 Athletics

KRS 156.070 - Athletics

• Any student that transfers enrollment from a district of residence to a nonresident district shall be ineligible to participate in interscholastic athletics for one (1) calendar year from the date of transfer.





It is KDE's position that districts may not charge tuition to students/parents for students included in the district's ADA calculation for participation in the SEEK fund based upon:

- Section 183 of the Kentucky Constitution requires the General Assembly to provide for an efficient system of common schools.
- Rose v. Council for Better Education, the Kentucky Supreme Court interpreted Section 183 of the Kentucky Constitution, holding that "common schools shall be free to all."
- Section 184 of the Constitution provides for appropriation of the common school fund to common schools and for no other purpose.

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District Coding of Nonresident Students

- Coding nonresident students will remain relatively unchanged.
- Local School Districts of enrollment will record the nonresident student status in Infinite Campus.
 - Resident District (enrollment tab) should be completed
 - Contract/noncontract Attendance Groups are NOT needed
- Once the nonresident student is enrolled in the school district, nonresident students are accounted for the same as resident students for purposes of SEEK and other ADA-based funding.
- Nonresident student review included in student attendance audits

SAAR Updates

- The SAAR will not be submitted for the 2021-2022 school year
 - For the 21-22 school year, districts will once again use the previous SAAR/ADA that was submitted to generate funding paid in 22-23. That data will be 18-19 for most districts, 19-20 for those who elected to submit during 19-20
- We will once again collect SAAR, Growth Factor and January Growth Factor reports during the 2022-2023 school year
 - This will give a baseline to start funding back for the 2023-24 school year
- Data cleanup is still required as data will be pulled for federal reporting and school report card

Clean-up Reminders

• QCE and QCP Attendance Groups

- Attendance Groups should have a start and end date
- Please check during your end of year clean up to ensure all groups have end dates
 - Path: KY State Reporting | KDE Reports | Student COVID-19 Attendance Group Detail Report
- 2022-23 School Year QCE and QCP Attendance Groups will not be tracked
 - Guidance will be provided for tracking communicable diseases outside of the attendance area

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Original Calendars

- 2022-23 Original and 2021-22 Amended Calendars must be submitted to KDE by June 30
- Submit Calendars to KDE through the Web Application.
- Items to check before submitting:
- Traditional calendars must have a minimum of 170 Instructional Days AND 1,062 hours of instruction
- Variable Instructional Calendars must have a minimum of 1,062 hours of instruction
 - Must start on or after August 29, 2022
- Should include make-up days equal to the maximum number of weather days in 2016-2017 through 2020-2021 school year

Amended Calendars

- 2021-22 Amended Calendars must be submitted to KDE through the <u>Web Application</u>.
- Special Session SB1 gave districts the ability to waive the 170 Instructional Days and only required to meet 1,062 hours of instruction
- Items to check before submitting:
 - Remove all unused make-up days
 - All Calendars must have a minimum of 185 school days (Remember to use E: Teacher Equivalency Day or G: Planning to reach 185)
 - Traditional calendars must have a minimum of 170 Instructional Days AND 1,062 hours of instruction

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- Variable Instructional Calendars must have a minimum of 1,062 hours of instruction

 - Path: KY State Reporting | KDE Reports | Calendar Summary

Summer School Calendar

- Districts may be offering summer school this year to help students
- Best Practice A separate calendar should be created to track summer school student information
- The calendar name should begin with SUM and can stretch into the month of July
