

Pre-Individual Learning Plan (ILP) Playbook Grades K-4

The Kentucky Individual Learning Plan (ILP) Playbook offers educators recommendations for chronological themes and lessons for career exploration and social and emotional development to teach at each grade level (K-4). The purpose is to emphasize career exposure and awareness.

Kentucky is among the first in the United States to couple career exploration and social and emotional learning (SEL). It has been developed using <u>Erik Erikson's Stages of Psychosocial Development</u> as a framework for understanding grades K-4 developmental tasks of achieving acquisition of basic virtues and successful ability to develop a strong sense of self.

We incorporated the principles of the CASEL Collaborating States Initiative (CSI) SEL and Career and Workforce Development Community of Practice (CoP) as described in the <u>Developmental Framework for</u> <u>the Integration of Social and Emotional Learning and Career and Workforce Development</u>. These principles, as shown in the image below, recommend explicit integration of SEL into all career and workforce development, emphasizing the need to remove equity barriers and build a foundation to support a student's Personalized Career and Academic Plan, i.e., Kentucky's ILP.



CAREER STUDIES STANDARDS

The "Kentucky Academic Standards for Career Studies" for grades K-12 are aligned to support both social and emotional learning and career exploration. There are three domains, Careers, Essential Skills and Financial Literacy. The Careers domain builds the foundation for students to develop and maintain their ILP. The standards in the Essential Skills domain meet the legal mandate for instruction in Essential Workplace Ethics. The Financial Literacy domain builds the foundation for students to meet the High School Graduation Requirement for Financial Literacy. CAREER EXPLORATION CONTINUUM

As mentioned, elementary career studies emphasize career exposure and awareness – not career choice.

Career exploration at the elementary school level should allow children to become more self-aware of their skills, abilities and interests and how those traits relate to future career goals. Integrating career conversations across the curriculum allows students to connect the classroom to the real world.

PRIMARY GRADES K-3

Students in kindergarten and 1st grade should be introduced to careers in their community. Students in the 2nd and 3rd grades can understand the similarities and differences between groups of careers making this an ideal time to introduce the 16 career clusters. This organizational framework is important to ensure equity by exposing students to a wide range of careers and providing opportunities for students to identify interests, skills and passions that will direct future career development.

INTERMEDIATE GRADES 4-5

Rather than focusing on a career, students in the 4th and 5th grades should begin the process of selfdiscovery by exploring the knowledge, skills and working environments common to careers within the 16 clusters.

STUDENT REFLECTION

Student reflection is an important part of career exploration. These student reflection sheets may be used to reinforce the knowledge, skills and aptitudes common in a career and guide students to gain a deeper understanding of their career goals.

KENTUCKY ELEMENTARY CAREER STUDIES RESOURCES

Kentucky has compiled a set of resources, organized by career clusters, to support career exploration and self-discovery. These activities do not constitute a curriculum, rather they provide a variety of activities to be used within the context of a career studies program that spans K-5. Each cluster resource progresses in rigor from those appropriate to kindergarten through 5th grade and may be modified to meet student needs. For each cluster, instructional routines may include:

- Engage students through videos, online activities, guest speakers or hands-on activities
- Explore by using texts from the cluster book list as read alouds or part of the classroom library

• Extend learning by using resources from this document in learning centers, individual work or group projects

CTE BASICS: A PROFESSIONAL LEARNING LIBRARY

Use these short, targeted video sessions for a basic overview of CTE needed by teachers and counselors as they engage students in career conversations and exploration.

ENGAGE OTHERS IN THE WORK

Effective career exploration does not require a major time requirement, but it does require coordinated planning with input from individuals from different roles and grade levels. Doing so, ensures an equal distribution of the work and allows all students access to a broad range of career exploration. Possible roles may include:

School Counselors

- Use the <u>Elementary School Career Studies Planning Toolkit</u> and work with teachers to identify gaps and create a map outlining the distribution of clusters across the grade bands;
- Support teachers by providing information and resources to support career exploration (The American School Counselor Association has developed <u>Career Conversation Starters</u> staff may use when mentoring students about their skill sets);
- The American School Counselor Association has created <u>learning objectives</u> that counselors can search by grade level and topic for college and career readiness.

Teachers

- provide instructional opportunities for students to engage in career exploration through multiple modalities, online activities, videos, literature and hands-on project-based and deeper learning experiences;
- include social-emotional workplace readiness skills within content.

Librarians/Media Specialists

• support integration of career exploration by <u>creating collections of books</u> organized by career clusters for teachers to use in their classroom libraries.

FRYSC Coordinators

• work with community partners to coordinate guest speakers, career fairs, etc.

CAREER STUDIES INSTRUCTION

Tools used to launch career exploration that embraces SEL in its practice is the use of project-based and deeper learning. This evidence-based approach is outlined in the document, with a project-based and

deeper learning example provided for each grade level. While the examples are designed to be cohesive to tasks identified at each grade level, **educators have creative freedom to select projects that work best for their students.** Consider resources and partnerships available to you, and aim to include as many of the <u>16</u> <u>career clusters into project aims</u>. This will be a fun opportunity to provide experiential learning that invites students to consider problems they want to solve in our world, rather than just "what they want to be when they grow up."

There is no single, ideal environment to facilitate ILP work, but <u>this video shows a great</u> <u>example of how you</u> <u>can intentionally schedule time for your students to do this work.</u>

The ILP Playbook is designed to be a useful tool to assist educators in creating meaningful ILPs and learning experiences for students. We know that it only takes one influential, inspiring, <u>positive adult</u> to change the trajectory of a child's life. ACCESS AND OPPORTUNITY

Career exploration is a matter of equity as schools consider how to provide access and opportunity for all students. An equitable career exploration plan should expose students to a wide spectrum of career opportunities that highlight a diverse population and foster inclusion and belonging as students discover their potential.

Students should begin to grasp the concept of postsecondary education and that, based upon their career choice, the preparation will vary. Some careers may require an industry certificate or license, apprenticeship, military experience or a college/university degree.



Kindergarten ILP Playbook

Message to Students

Kindergarten is a time to become aware of what a career is. Students will learn the definition of a career and explore what types of tools, uniforms and skills are necessary in a variety of careers. Self-awareness of responsibilities they can contribute within their school, home and community allow students to feel a sense of purpose and belonging.

Elementary School Planning

• Students need to learn independence for life skills daily in all areas of school (i.e., organizing

1st Grade ILP Playbook

Message to Students

First grade is a time to explore reasons why people work and jobs within the community. Students will begin to learn how industry works within their own community. Developing a sense of trust among adults helps students develop a positive image of what leaders in careers look like locally.

2nd Grade ILP Playbook

Message to Students

Second grade focuses on student self-awareness with unique skills, interests and abilities that can influence their choice of careers. Students becoming aware of their own unique abilities will help them learn to work with others that possess other skills to create synergy among different activities and projects. You will learn how your own talents, interests and hobbies can become a lifelong career. Many careers are connected through the <u>16 Career Clusters</u> so you can learn about many careers based on your interests.

3rd Grade ILP Playbook

Message to Students

Students at this age begin to develop independence and voice in their own talents, skills, and what purpose they serve within their school, home and community. Communication begins to show as they solve conflict with peers and share their wants and needs for success to the trusted adults surrounding them. Learning how the academic skills they apply daily will help them successfully obtain and sustain a career is vital at this age to enforce the importance of school.

• Student-led career fair is a hands-on, interactive activity. Students choose a career they are interested in to showcase schoolwide and to families.

A variety of activity options are available from KDE's <u>Career Cluster Activity Chart</u>. Encourage your students to try new activities, challenges and see what they are interested in to provide individualized learning experiences.

Guest speakers from a variety of backgrounds and careers may also visit classrooms to ensure students see many options for a possible career. Keep the idea of windows and mirrors in mind when planning. How are students seeing representations of themselves (through mirrors) and others (through windows).
