



Creating a Sensory Supportive Classroom

Build in opportunities for movement during daily routines.

Collaborate with related service providers.

Create a calm environment.



Co-Plan with general education teachers to create hands-on lessons.

Allow all students access to sensory supportive items as appropriate, such as seating choice.



Build in Opportunities for Movement

- Movement benefits all students;
- Make movement breaks part of the daily routine;
- Give students the choice to stand and work as needed; and
- Work with related service providers to create sensory pathways.



Engagement Through Movement



Co-plan with the general education team to look at unit lessons and think through how movement can be incorporated.



Collaborate to develop active participation strategies for whole group learning.



Calm and Sensory Supportive Classroom

Create a calm classroom space free of visual clutter; less is more.

Take into
consideration when a
poster, anchor chart
or bulletin board can
be a portable
resource kept with
students instead.

Be mindful of where students are sitting to decrease inattention as much as possible.

Use soft lighting or light filters.

Teach expectations for volume level.


Build mindfulness and calming activities into the daily routine. Have a space for students who prefer to work independently away from the group.
