Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is a way to present information in multiple formats and with high-interest options, allowing students to demonstrate their knowledge in a method of choice.

Three principles:

- Engagement
- Representation
- Action and Expression

Maximize generalization





Number sign: #1 Wildcats Fan!


Hashtag: Congrats on the new job! #success

Weight: That bag of sugar weighs 5#.




