#### BOARD APPROVES CHANGES TO PROGRAM REVIEWS

At its August 4 session, the Kentucky Board of Education approved several changes to the Program Review process to greatly streamline it. These changes were recommended by the Commissioner's Task Force on Program Reviews, which was charged with offering solutions to the main issues schools and districts have raised.

Below is a chart reflecting the changes for the 2016-17 school year:

### REPORT ON SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM HEARD AT AUGUST MEETING

The Kentucky Board of Education heard an update on the Summer Food Service Program that is administered by the Division of School and Community Nutrition. The primary purpose of the program is to provide food service to children from needy areas during periods when schools and districts are closed for vacation.

#### The board learned that:

- This summer more than 150 sponsoring organizations are administering the program at the local level.
- More than 2,000 Summer Food Service Program sites in Kentucky provide over 3,000 meal opportunities for children.
- Summer meals can include breakfast, lunch, snack or supper and may be served seven days a week.
- Meals are for children 0-18 years of age.
