Instructions (1/1)

Sections 1117 and 8501 of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) require that timely and meaningful consultation between the local educational agency (LEA) and each nonpublic school occur prior to any decision about the equitable services to be provided to eligible nonpublic school students, teachers, and other educational personnel. Consultation must continue throughout the implementation and assessment of these activities.

The federal programs for which equitable services to nonpublic schools must be provided include:

- Title I, Part A: Improving Basic Programs Operated by Local Educational Agencies
- Title I, Part C: Education of Migratory Children
- Title II, Part A: Supporting Effective Instruction
- Title III, Part A: English Language Acquisition, Language Enhancement, and Academic Achievement Act
- Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment Grants
- Title IV, Part B: 21st Century Community Learning Centers

The forms contained in this packet <u>must</u> be used during consultation meetings to guide the conversation between the LEA and the nonpublic school. The forms include the following:

- A needs assessment for each federal program and
- A "Nonpublic School Consultation Agreement".

For each federal program that is marked:

- 1. Jointly complete the applicable needs assessment(s) with the nonpublic school;
- 2. Use the needs assessment(s) to complete the "Nonpublic School Consultation Agreement" to describe how the LEA will provide equitable services to eligible nonpublic school students, teachers, and other educational personnel.
- 3. Maintain copies of the signed forms at the district office. When the Grant Management Application Program (GMAP) application is opened for new grant applications, you will be provided instructions for uploading this document into the system. **Please upload the entire, signed packet into GMAP.**

This agreement, in conjunction with the applicable needs assessments, contain the minimum requirements under federal law. LEAs that have uploaded these documents for each participating nonpublic school will have satisfied the ESSA requirement that consultation agreements be forwarded to the state's private school ombudsman. This will be done through an upload into GMAP.

<u>Obligation of Funds</u>: Parties understand and acknowledge that under ESSA, funds are to be obligated for services during the school year for which they are allocated, as required in Sections 1117(a)(4)(B) and 8501(a)(4)(B).

<u>No Consultation Agreement:</u> If nonpublic school officials do not provide an affirmation that consultation has occurred under ESSA Section 1117(b)(1) within a reasonable period of time, the LEA shall forward the documentation that such consultation, or attempts at such consultation, have taken place, to the State Education Agency, as required in ESSA Sections 1117(b)(5) and 8501(c)(5). If the LEA disagrees with the views of the nonpublic school officials with respect to an issue described above or the nonpublic school's request to receive services through a contract, the LEA shall provide in writing to such private school officials the reasons why the LEA disagrees, as required in ESSA Sections 1117(b)(2) and 8501(c)(2).

<u>Complaint Process</u>: Parties understand and acknowledge that pursuant to ESSA Section 1117(b)(6) and 8501(c)(6), nonpublic school officials have the right to file a complaint with the SEA if they believe that LEA officials have not complied with appropriate legal requirements including but not limited to:

- Engagement in consultation that was meaningful and timely;
- Consideration of the views of the nonpublic schools; or
- Decisions that treat the nonpublic school equitably as required by ESSA.
- Any dispute involving the poverty data on nonpublic school students may be appealed to the SEA, as allowed in ESSA Section 1117(c)(2).

Complaints may be filed by emailing a detailed and signed letter to the Kentucky Equitable Services Ombudsman at <u>KPSO@education.ky.gov</u>. The SEA is required to provide a written resolution within 45 days. If the SEA's resolution is not satisfactory, nonpublic school officials may appeal to the United States Secretary of Education within 30 days of receipt of the SEA's decision, or after the 45-day deadline has passed, if unresolved. ESSA mandates that the Secretary must complete an investigation and resolve the appeal of the SEA's decision within 90 days.
